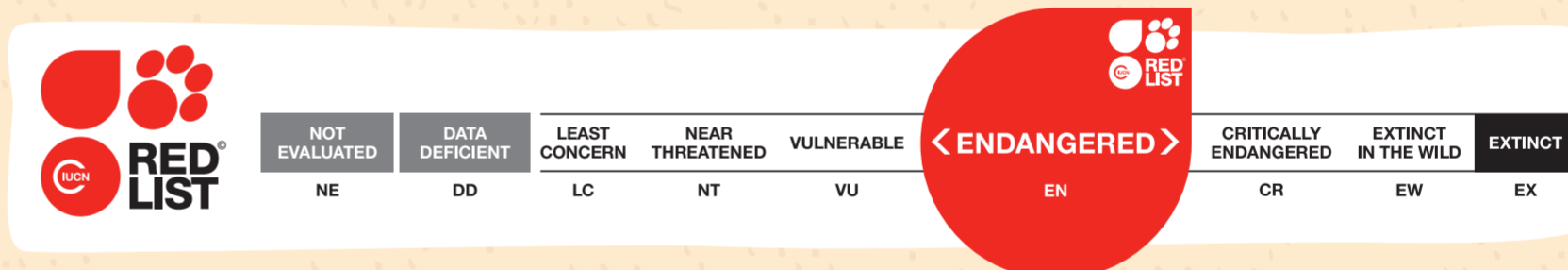
Bubalus depressicornis



Lowland anoa are a very rare species of cattle found only on the islands of Sulawesi and Buton, Indonesia.

Little is known about this elusive species that live alone in the forest. They forage on vegetation and for fruits.

Both males and females have horns. However males are usually darker in colour than females. They are the smallest species of wild cattle in the world.

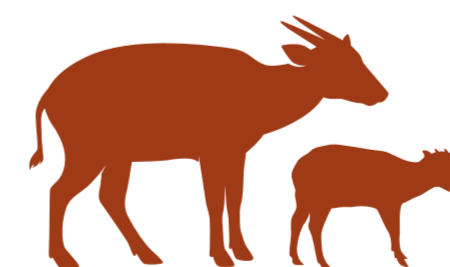
